If you do not receive the survey invitation, please check your Junk email folder; if it is not there, please contact your school. If you do not have an email listed with the school, please contact the front office for a paper copy.

The Parents and Carers Survey will be available online in other languages: Arabic, Chinese, Hindi, Korean, Urdu, Vietnamese, Punjabi, Bengali, Spanish, Telugu, French and Italian. Respondents can select their preferred language when they start the survey. A shortened paper-version of the Parents and Carers Survey is also available in the following 5 languages: Dari, Dinka, Farsi, Karen and Mon. These surveys are available at the Front Office.

For the results to reflect the opinions of our whole school community, we need as many parents and carers, staff and students as possible to complete the survey. ### **Home Energy Tune-up**

Though Winter has almost ended, recent electricity and gas bills might still be giving you cold chills. Whether you are a homeowner or renter, assessing your household energy needs can be tricky if you don't know where to start.

Care, Vinnies and the ACT Government's Climate Choices program can help give support and education to families looking to tune-up their home energy needs. These organisations strive to help by offering free draught proofing services and education on how to reduce energy use.

Qualified Vinnies Energy Efficiency officers provide tailored advice, energy efficient appliances (such as throw rugs or curtains), and referrals to other programs. They can also help through modification via installing draught sealing gaps around doors, windows, and vents.

Working alongside the Vinnie's program is the Care Financial Capability team, who can help to review energy bills, set up bill-paying systems, give advice on concessions and rebates, and link households to utility hardship programs. Care also receives funding from ActewAGL and the ACT Government to provide Energy Support Vouchers. These \$100 vouchers to be credited to your ActewAGL electricity or gas accounts.

## **Literacy**

Kindergarten have started informative writing, developing their understanding of the difference between a fact and opinion. We used the children's book 'Flip Flap Zoo' to explore facts and then made our own class version of a flip flap book. We are very excited for our excursion to the zoo on Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> September, where we will choose an animal to investigate for our next writing task.

### Maths

In Maths we have been investigating Addition. We explored 'Friends of Ten' and used our new knowledge to play a range of maths games. We have been learning what '+' and '=' mean, and different strategies for adding quantities together, with a focus on using manipulatives and 'counting on' to solve a range of equations.













### **Science**

This term we have been conducting experiments to determine which materials would make 'The Perfect Package' as part of our Science unit. The plan is for our package to hold a biscuit. No one wants a melted, crushed or soggy biscuit, so we looked at which materials are waterproof, will not crush or overheat. This week we designed our package, choosing which materials we think we will best hold our biscuit. We are so excited to start making our packages next week. Stay tuned to see how our biscuits go!






# Year 1 and 2

In K-2BR we have been looking at how sentences are constructed. We have noticed that they start with a capital letter, end with a full stop and contain nouns. We have been exploring this by examining our reading books, practising speaking in full sentences, editing our writing and reconstructing cut up sentences. This work is individualised to each student's level of need. Our students are becoming more independent when engaging in handwriting practise and utilising resources in our room such as alphabet charts.







The Year 5/6 team have continued to work hard and have lots of fun over the last few weeks. We can't believe it is over halfway through the term already!

Last week we celebrated Book Week with students embracing the opportunity to celebrate literature by dressing up as their favourite book characters. From magical wizards to childhood favourites and beloved heroes, the range of costumes was truly impressive! A huge thank you to all parents and carers who helped put together these amazing costumes, it was so wonderful to see most of our students get into the spirit of Book Week and celebrate their love of reading.







In our Writing unit this term, we have been focusing on the skill of writing to inform. Students have been delving into the world of fact and opinion and are learning to critically analyse sources to determine whether the information presented is factual or a matter of opinion. This skill is vital for developing their research abilities and understanding the importance of credible information. Through various activities, including debates and source evaluations, students are enhancing their ability to distinguish between objective facts and subjective viewpoints. We have had so much fun reading through fake AI generated new articles about Donald Trump going to space with his pet cat and looking up factual and reliable information about many weird and wonderful topics. Students are developing a keen eye for detail and critical thinking during these activities, which they will now apply when completing a biography about a person of interest to them.

Science this term has been nothing short of illuminating—quite literally! Our focus has been on the fascinating topic of light. Students have been busy experimenting with how light behaves, exploring concepts such as

reflection, refraction, and the colour spectrum. Hands-on activities, including creating simple optical instruments and conducting experiments with prisms, have helped bring these concepts to life. The enthusiasm and perseverance shown during these lessons has been amazing as students have been eager to share their discoveries and understanding of how light interacts with the world around us.

# Maths and Science

Week 4 of this term marked the celebration of National Science Week, a time dedicated to sparking curiosity, exploring new ideas, and deepening our understanding of the world around us. This year's theme, "Species Survival — more than just sustainability," was especially significant as it emphasized the vital role that innovation and scientific research play in keeping ecosystems strong and resilient. Our students engaged with this theme through a variety of exciting and educational activities.

On Wednesday, 21 of our Year 9 students had the privilege of visiting the CSIRO Bushfire Research Laboratory, part of Australia's leading scientific research organization. The visit was an eye-opening experience, offering students a firsthand look at cutting-edge research aimed at understanding and mitigating bushfires. A highlight of the visit was witnessing two different types of wind tunnels used by scientists to simulate bushfire conditions. One of these wind tunnels is specifically designed to study how embers, capable of traveling up to 40 kilometers, can ignite new fires far from the original source. The students were fascinated by this demonstration, which brought home the real-world applications of scientific research and its importance in protecting our environment.





Meanwhile, our Year 7 science classes have been diving into the world of physics, particularly the study of forces. To bring these concepts to life, students participated in a practical science class where they created their own parachutes. This hands-on activity allowed them to observe the main forces at work—gravity and drag. As they released their parachutes, students saw how gravity pulls the parachute downward, causing it to accelerate towards the ground, while drag acts as a counterforce, slowing the descent. This simple yet effective experiment helped students better understand the principles of physics in a fun and engaging way.

### BUNGEE
